ORDINANCE NO. 20-11

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Township Council of the Township of Jackson, County of Ocean, and State of New Jersey, as follows:

SECTION 1. Pursuant to 40:55D-62 and subsequent to the adoption of the Township of Jackson Master Plan in August of 2009, the Township Code of the Township of Jackson is hereby amended and supplemented so as to amend Chapter 109, entitled “Land Use and Development Regulations,” so as to create a new section 109-130.1 entitled “Lots of Record”.

SECTION 2. §109-130.1 “Lots of Record” recognizes the existence of numerous single family homes developed on lots that were previously approved by the Planning Board prior to the changes in state and local regulations which would render same lots inconsistent as described in the 2009 Master Plan Land Use Plan element provisions and recommendations, and therefore same lots are to be considered “grandfathered” as follows:

§109-130.1. Lots of record.

- A. Where a residential nonconforming lot was previously created by a subdivision approved by the Jackson Township Planning Board, and where such lot was located in the R-1 Residential Zone, and where such lot was a conforming lot at the time of such subdivision approval, and where a single family home was developed on such lot, such residence may be expanded and accessory structures may constructed as long as same shall be in conformance with §109-44.1 R-1 Residential Zone District, provided that;
- (1) At the time of and since the adoption of the ordinance making such lot nonconforming, the owner of the lot did not own adjoining property which may be (have been) used to cause such lot to become a conforming lot; and
 - (2) the required front yard, side yard and rear yard setbacks are met as required in the R-1 Residential Zone; and
 - (3) said lot shall have a minimum area of 43,560 square feet; and
 - (4) this section shall apply only to the non-Pinelands area of Jackson Township.

SECTION 3. After introduction of this ordinance, the Township Clerk shall send a copy of this ordinance to the Municipal Planning Board for its review and comment. The Township Clerk shall also send copies of this ordinance to all adjoining municipalities pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40:55D-15, and to the Ocean County Planning Board pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40:55D-16 by certified mail at least ten (10) days prior to the proposed second reading and adoption of this ordinance.

SECTION 4. This ordinance shall take effect after second reading and publication as required by law, filing of the ordinance with the Ocean County Planning Board, approval by the Mayor pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40:69A-41 and the passage of twenty (20) days from adoption by the governing body pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40:69A-18.1.

SECTION 5. After adoption of this ordinance on second reading, the Township Clerk shall file a certified copy of this ordinance with the Ocean County Planning Board.

SECTION 6. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 7. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision, and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions hereof.

ORDINANCE NO. 21-11

**TITLE: AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF JACKSON,
COUNTY OF OCEAN, STATE OF NEW JERSEY TO CHANGE
THE ELECTION DATE OF THE NONPARTISAN MUNICIPAL**

ELECTION FROM THE SECOND TUESDAY OF MAY TO THE DATE OF THE NOVEMBER GENERAL ELECTION.

COUNCILMAN KAFTON: He explained that this ordinance is about moving the nonpartisan election from May to November. His concern is that the voters of Jackson Township voted on the nonpartisan election in May and he thinks if this Council changes this to November it is taking the vote away from the voters. Another concern is they would be extending their own terms by six months and he isn't sure if that is legal. He believes this should be put out again to the voters at the next election. Council President Martin explained that the purpose of this isn't to extend anyone's terms but to save money. It is his understanding they could save at least \$45,000 and they are encouraging more voter participation by moving it. The only thing they are doing is changing the date, it is still going to be nonpartisan and they are still going to have a directly elected Mayor. In closing, he stated that there is almost double the amount of people who vote in the November election compared to May.

COUNCILWOMAN RIVERE: She too believes that this should be put to the voters. She doesn't believe that five people should be able to decide to move an election and extend their own terms. This is giving them six months extra pay and she isn't comfortable with that. She believes that the voters will move it to November, but that should be their decision.

COUNCILWOMAN UPDEGRAVE: She doesn't believe it's wrong with voting for this by ordinance. She believes people have been confused by the May election as far as what it was for. She thinks if everything is moved to the November ballot it would be better.

COUNCIL VICE PRESIDENT BRESSI: He too believes that the election should be moved to November. They will be saving \$45,000 and even more importantly voter turn out is almost doubled for the November election.

COUNCILMAN KAFTON: He addressed Council Vice President Bressi and stated in the past Mr. Bressi thought this should go to the voters. He isn't saying he is for or against it, but it should be the voter's decision. He later added that this is a major change from what the voters voted for. Council Vice President Bressi explained in researching it and finding out the amount of money they can save and looking at the voter turn out he did change his mind. He's looking toward next years budget and different ways to save money.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT MARTIN: He disagreed with Councilman Kafton and reiterated that they are not changing the form of government. They are just moving the election to November to increase voter participation.

COUNCILWOMAN RIVERE: She addressed Attorney Cipriani and asked if the Council is now voting to extend their terms and get more money is that not an improper act? She later added that she doesn't know how they are saving money because if this is voted on in November it won't be in next years budget, so they will still be saving the same amount of money. Council President Martin stated that the State passed a law on this so it's not improper. Attorney Cipriani explained that historically this wouldn't be acceptable, but the nature of this law allows for this in the statute. Councilman Kafton asked Attorney Cipriani how many ordinances she prepared for tonight. Attorney Cipriani stated two. One, which allows for this under the statute and the other, has this going out to referendum. Council President Martin explained that he thought it was prudent to have the attorney prepare both because he wasn't sure how everyone was voting tonight. He believes that by saving money and increasing voter participation they are serving the voter's best interest.

COUNCIL VICE PRESIDENT BRESSI: He began by saying that if you look at the State of New Jersey they would see how many towns did this by ordinance. Secondly, the Citizens Budget Advisory Committee made this recommendation. Thirdly, if you look at the Charter Study that was done to form this government it stated the election should have stayed in November.

ORDINANCE 21 -11

WHEREAS, the New Jersey Legislature enacted P.L. 2009 c. 196, providing that any municipality governed by the provisions of the “Uniform Nonpartisan Elections Law” (N.J.S.A. 40:45-5 et seq.) may choose to conduct regular municipal elections on the day of the general election, the Tuesday after the first Monday in November; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and the Township Council of the Township of Jackson recognizes that the likelihood of increased voter participation and decreased election expenses will be realized.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Township Council of the Township of Jackson, County of Ocean, and State of New Jersey, as follows:

SECTION 1:

The Township of Jackson shall conduct nonpartisan regular municipal elections on the day of the general election, the Tuesday after the first Monday in November.

SECTION 2:

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions thereof.

ORDINANCE 22-11

TITLE: AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF JACKSON, COUNTY OF OCEAN, STATE OF NEW JERSEY AMENDING AND SUPPLEMENTING THE MUNICIPAL CODE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF JACKSON, SO AS TO AMEND CHAPTER 103, ENTITLED “VEHICLES AND TRAFFIC.”

COUNCILMAN KAFTON: He wanted to clarify that this ordinance is not allowing people to have unregistered vehicles on their property if it is property that the public is allowed to go on. It also says that car dealerships are excluded, but it doesn't exclude auto wrecking yards, repair shops or body shops. Attorney Cipriani stated it's not explicit, but it talks about those who are exempt under Title 39 and that would include what Councilman Kafton asked about. She explained that the language could be changed to be more specific. This isn't a substantial change; therefore they can go ahead with the vote. Councilman Kafton explained that he is abstaining from this vote because his father owns an auto wrecking business in town.

ORDINANCE 22 -11

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Township Council of the Township of Jackson, County of Ocean, and State of New Jersey, as follows:

SECTION 1. The Township Code of the Township of Jackson is hereby amended and supplemented so as to amend Chapter 103, entitled “Vehicles and Traffic,” so as to add Article LV entitled “Unregistered Vehicles” which shall include § 103-337 through § 103- 340.

SECTION 2. The Township Code of the Township of Jackson is hereby amended and supplemented so as to amend Chapter 103, entitled “Vehicles and Traffic,” so as to add § 103-337, entitled “Prohibition of unregistered vehicles” which shall read as follows:

No person shall store or abandon or permit the storage or abandonment of any motor vehicle which is unregistered or which has a suspended registration out of doors upon any public or private parking lots in any zone in the township or in any public parking spaces along the streets of the Township which are open to the public or to which the public is invited whether the lot is owned by the government or any private or business entity.

SECTION 3. The Township Code of the Township of Jackson is hereby amended and supplemented so as to amend Chapter 103, entitled “Vehicles and Traffic,” so as to add § 103-338, entitled “Exemptions” which shall read as follows:

A. The provisions of this article shall not apply to a vehicle on the premises of a private residence or other private property to which the public is not invited.

B. The provisions of this article shall not apply to unregistered motor vehicles which are exempt from registration under Title 39 of the New Jersey Statutes, for example vehicles stored on the lot of a car dealership, motor vehicle repair establishments or vehicles held in an appropriate storage place or depository maintained in a lawful place and manner by the Township.

SECTION 4. The Township Code of the Township of Jackson is hereby amended and supplemented so as to amend Chapter 103, entitled “Vehicles and Traffic,” so as to add § 103-339, entitled “Impoundment of unregistered vehicles” which shall read as follows:

Whenever any abandoned or unregistered vehicle is found in violation of the provisions of this article, any member of the police department is authorized to issue a summons to any person deemed to be in violation. In addition, any member of the police department is authorized to immediately remove or cause to be removed and impound such motor vehicle without the necessity of prior notification.

SECTION 5. The Township Code of the Township of Jackson is hereby amended and supplemented so as to amend Chapter 103, entitled “Vehicles and Traffic,” so as to add § 103-340, entitled “Fines and Fees” which shall read as follows:

A. The expense of removal and storage of the vehicle shall be borne by the owner of the vehicle, except that in the case of a leased vehicle the expense is to be borne by the lessee.

B. Violators pursuant to this article are subject to a fine of \$100.

ORDINANCE 23 -11

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Township Council of the Township of Jackson, County of Ocean, and State of New Jersey, as follows:

SECTION 1. Chapter 3 of the Township Code of the Township of Jackson, entitled “Administration of Government,” Article V, entitled “Administrative Organization,” § 3-38, entitled “General plan,” subsection A, entitled “Departments” is hereby amended and supplemented so as delete subsection (6) in its entirety, and replace it with the word “Reserved.”

SECTION 2. Chapter 3 of the Township Code of the Township of Jackson, entitled “Administration of Government,” is hereby amended and supplemented so as delete Article XI, entitled “Department of Recreation and Senior Services,” in its entirety, and replace it with the word “Reserved.”

SECTION 3. Chapter 3 of the Township Code of the Township of Jackson, entitled “Administration of Government,” is hereby amended and supplemented so as amend Article X, entitled “Department Public Works,” § 3-126, entitled “Divisions within Department of Public Works,” so as to create a new subsection E, which shall read in its entirety as follows: “Division of Recreation and Senior Services.”

SECTION 4. Chapter 3 of the Township Code of the Township of Jackson, entitled “Administration of Government,” is hereby amended and supplemented so as amend Article X, entitled “Department of Public Works,” so as to create a new § 3-131, entitled “Powers and duties of Division of Recreation and Senior Services,” which shall read in its entirety as follows:

§ 3-131. Powers and duties of Division of Recreation and Senior Services.

The Division of Recreation and Senior Services shall:

- A. Administer the work of the Division, and administer and operate playgrounds, facilities for indoor and outdoor sports, athletic, cultural and recreational programs and activities for children, youth and adults of the Township, including celebration of events, holiday activities and summer camps; and where authorized by law and by ordinance of the Township Council, charge and collect on behalf of the Township a reasonable fee for each person for admission to or use of facilities, programs and activities provided for under this provision.
- B. Use public school property by agreement with the Board of Education.
- C. Plan and develop additional public recreational areas and facilities.
- D. Cooperate with other municipal departments, service clubs and organizations in furthering recreational and cultural interests in the Township.
- E. Adopt reasonable rules, regulations and bylaws, subject to approval of the Council, for the conduct of all persons participating in programs and activities or utilizing recreational facilities or equipment sponsored by the Division.
- F. Study, investigate, develop and recommend recreation programs in conjunction with the Recreation Committee.
- G. Conduct studies of the present and future recreational needs of the Township and develop immediate and long-range plans in consultation with the Recreation Committee for recommendation to the Mayor and the Township Council.
- H. Maintain such records as may be required to control Division receipts, property and personnel, and provide information to the Mayor for budgeting and financing of recreational programs. Such records shall include time cards, or the equivalent Township-approved time-tracking device, for part-time and seasonal personnel.
- I. Be responsible to the Township Council for the proper custody and preservation of the books, records and property under the Division's control, and the faithful performance of the duties of the Division.
- J. Submit to the Mayor monthly reports concerning the conduct and progress of the Division, including receipts and monies.
- K. Administer the expenditure of funds in accordance with the annual budget.
- L. Hire part-time and seasonal staff as needed, with the approval of the Mayor, to carry out the functions of the Division.

SECTION 5. Chapter 3 of the Township Code of the Township of Jackson, entitled "Administration of Government," is hereby amended and

supplemented so as amend Article X, entitled “Department of Public Works,” so as to create a new § 3-132, entitled “Assistant Recreation Supervisor,” which shall read in its entirety as follows:

§ 3-132. Assistant Recreation Supervisor.

- A. There may be an Assistant Recreation Supervisor who shall assist the Director in the administration and operation of the programs and activities of the Division. The Assistant Recreation Supervisor shall be appointed by the Director, with the approval of the Mayor. The Assistant Recreation Supervisor shall possess a bachelor’s degree in recreation, or a closely related field, and have three years of experience in managing and operating recreational programs and activities. Additional experience may be substituted for the education requirement on a year-for-year basis, with 30 semester-hour credits being equal to one year of experience.
- B. The Assistant Recreation Supervisor shall carry out such duties as specifically designated by the Director and in the absence of the Director, assume all of the duties, responsibilities, and powers of the Director as designated for the Division in this section.

SECTION 6. Chapter 3 of the Township Code of the Township of Jackson, entitled “Administration of Government,” is hereby amended and supplemented so as amend Article X, entitled “Department of Public Works,” so as to create a new § 3-133, entitled “Senior Services Program,” which shall read in its entirety as follows:

§ 3-133. Senior Services Program.

There is hereby created within the Division of Recreation and Senior Services, the Senior Services Program, the head of which shall be the Recreation Program Administrator. The Recreation Program Administrator shall be appointed on the basis of education, background and experience in the field of senior citizen program administration, which shall include graduation from a four-year course at an accredited college or university, and three years’ experience in planning, developing and supervising recreational programs designed especially for the elderly. The Recreation Program Administrator shall coordinate and develop senior citizens programs and activities in the Township.

SECTION 7. Chapter 3 of the Township Code of the Township of Jackson, entitled “Administration of Government,” is hereby amended and supplemented so as amend Article X, entitled “Department of Public Works,” so as to create a new § 3-134, entitled “Powers and duties of the Senior Services Program,” which shall read in its entirety as follows:

§ 3-134. Powers and duties of the Senior Services Program.

Under the direction and supervision of the Recreation Program Administrator, the Senior Services Program shall:

- A. Develop programs and coordinate projects directed to the development of needed senior services in the Township.
- B. Act as liaison between the Mayor and Township Council and various senior service agencies and programs, both public and private, on the local, state and federal levels.
- C. Actively seek out and advise of grants, funds and loans which may be available for senior services and related programs.
- D. Develop an understanding of the problems of senior citizens.
- E. Establish a central location where senior citizens facing the problems of aging can turn for assistance through information on community resources.
- F. Identify, locate and expand available community resources for senior citizens and the making of efforts to cause such resources to be more readily accessible and available to those who need them.
- G. Act as a liaison between individual senior citizens, senior citizen groups and community resources and facilities and assistance to senior citizens.
- H. Refer to the appropriate municipal officials of any problems of individual senior citizens or groups of senior citizens relating to the functioning of municipal government, its agencies and instrumentalities.
- I. Distribute information on resources available to senior citizens.
- J. Render assistance to senior citizens in dealing with the problems of aging, including assistance programs for senior citizens, recreation, social and entertainment programs available for senior citizens.

SECTION 8. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 9. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision, and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions hereof.

SECTION 10. This ordinance shall take effect after second reading and publication as required by law.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT MARTIN: He explained that this resolution is requesting fair distribution of State aid to all the districts. In the past, 31 Abbott districts received half the money and the other 500 districts split the remaining amount. This is one of the reasons why our property taxes are so high in New Jersey and in Jackson Township.

MAYOR REINA: He stated that he stands behind this resolution because in some inner city schools we are paying up to \$40,000 per child to be educated with a 25% graduation rate. If this passes and it's a fair and equal distribution to all municipalities we will be able to see the difference in our taxes. He commended the Council for supporting this resolution.

WHEREAS, the Township of Jackson, County of Ocean believes that every child should have equal resources of state aid distributed by the legislature for an education in the State of New Jersey by utilizing a fair school funding mechanism; and

WHEREAS, the current distribution of state aid for education to the schools has not been distributed in a fair and equitable manner to provide property tax relief to all the citizens of the State of New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, Article III., Paragraph 1, of the New Jersey State Constitution states, "The powers of government shall be divided among three distinct branches, the legislative, executive, and judicial. No person or persons belonging to or constituting one branch shall exercise any of the powers properly belonging to either of the others, except as expressly provided in this Constitution;" and

WHEREAS, Article VIII, Section IV, Paragraph 1, of the New Jersey State Constitution states, "the Legislature shall provide for the maintenance and support of a thorough and efficient system of free public schools for the instruction of all children in the State between the ages of five and eighteen year;" and

WHEREAS, Article VIII, Section IV, Paragraph 2, of the New Jersey State Constitution states, "the fund for the support of free public schools . . . shall be annually appropriated to the support of free public schools, and for the equal benefit of all the people of this State;" and

WHEREAS, Article VIII, Section I, Paragraph 7.a. of the New Jersey State Constitution states, the income tax is to be "annually appropriated . . . exclusively for the purpose of reducing or offsetting property taxes;" and

WHEREAS, this body can no longer bear the burden of the continued diversion of its fair share of state school aid for the students between the ages of five and eighteen years of age who reside within this jurisdiction.

COUNCILMAN KAFTON: In this resolution they are asking commercial properties that were over taxed to wait to get their tax refunds, but they are not asking residential properties that are over taxed to wait and get their refunds. He doesn't believe they should be asking either one to wait. He stated that they should be encouraging commercial businesses not telling them that they over paid and they will give them their money back in two to three years. Council President Martin explained they are not passing the law, but supporting it. Council Vice President Bressi stated that this has to do with the way they have to file their appeal, which gives the town time to budget for this. Councilwoman Updegrave added that it also allows for municipalities to put a tool in to effect to prevent increasing property taxes that are already high.

WHEREAS, there is currently pending in the New Jersey Legislature, Senate Bill No. S-2762 and Assembly Bill No. A-4084 which, if enacted, would permit a municipality to pay commercial and industrial property tax refunds for tax year 2010 and 2011 over three subsequent local budget years; and

WHEREAS, municipalities do rely and encourage business development in their community for economic growth; and

WHEREAS, unlike a residential tax appeal, commercial and industrial property owners must submit an income statement when filing their appeal as net income generated by property which has a direct bearing on the ability to market the property and therefore it's value; and

WHEREAS, successful tax appeals shifts the burden of the appeal to the rest of the taxpayers within the community; and

WHEREAS, Senate Bill No. S-2762 and Assembly Bill No. A-4084 will provide municipalities with a temporary tool to assist in planning and controlling their financial budgets during this influx of appeals; and

WHEREAS, the governing body of the Township of Jackson supports the need for the legislation to address property tax refunds for commercial and industrial properties and firmly believes that by allowing phased refunds on successful commercial and industrial property appeals, these bills will provide substantial relief for many residential taxpayers; and

WHEREAS, the League of Municipalities recently conducted a survey that measured the extent to which property owners filed and won tax appeals in 2010, in which 150 municipalities, representing a cross section of the state, participated; and

WHEREAS, those participating in the survey reported property value declines of more than \$87,900,000, which resulted from 19,788 tax appeals filed in 2010; and

WHEREAS, those responding to the survey indicated that 13,760 appeals were filed in 2009, compared to 19,788 in 2010, representing an increase of 43.7%; and

WHEREAS, while a municipality will often experience an increase in tax appeals because they have conducted a revaluation, only 5 of the 150 municipalities, which participated in our survey, indicated that their 2010 appeals resulted from revaluations compared to the 23 of the participating municipalities conducted revaluations in 2009, when fewer tax appeals were presented to the County Tax Boards; and

WHEREAS, the 2010 spike in appeals should be attributed to the economic down-turn, which lowered property values and placed increased stress on the income of property owners, all around our Garden State; and

WHEREAS, although the survey was a snapshot picture in time, it can be used to project what might follow in 2011 and beyond, since the reductions, which were granted by the County Tax Boards will have a multiplier effect; and

WHEREAS, while New Jersey and this nation struggle to recover from one of the worst economic crisis since the Great Depression, municipalities must be given the tools to prevent increasing property taxes on already strained tax payers; and

WHEREAS, successful tax appeals impact fund balances and place additional pressures on the local budget;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Township Council of the Township of Jackson, in the County of Ocean, and State of New Jersey, as follows:

DISCUSSION AGENDA:

ESTABLISH MEETING DATE FOR THE JULY REORGANIZATION MEETING:

DEPUTY CLERK KISTY: She suggested that the reorganization meeting be held on July 5, 2011 at 7:00 PM and the next regularly scheduled Council Meeting be held on July 26, 2011. The Council was all in agreement.

NJ TRANSIT – BUS STOP REQUESTS:

DEPUTY CLERK KISTY: She explained that there was a request by NJ Transit for bus stops within the township. The request was sent to Pat Mackin of our Police Department who responded to the Council with changes. Pat Mackin will speak to the County on how to proceed because these are all County roads.

R-30 RESIDENTIAL ZONE ORDINANCE:

COUNCILMAN BRESSI: He explained that the R-30 are zones that were in place for many years and when they redid the master plan they found out there was no ordinance controlling them and how they were being handled. This puts people in a bad position because they have to get a variance for minor things that they would otherwise qualify for. This is grandfathering them in but any new lot would have to meet the 1 acre requirements. Council agreed to put an ordinance on at the next meeting.

MERCANTILE LICENSES – REMOVED FROM DISCUSSION

MAYOR COMMENTS:

MAYOR REINA: He congratulated the graduating class of 2011.

PUBLIC HEARING, ANY TOPIC

ELEANOR HANNUM, 7 EVERGREEN CT: She stated she was looking at the minutes from October 12th and she questioned Resolution 442R-10 authorizing a shared

services agreement with Ocean County for the leaf and vegetative compost program. In September before they entered into the agreement they spoke about putting the facility at the old Legler site or off of Hope Chapel Road. Councilwoman Updegrave, Councilwoman Rivere and Councilman Kafton raised concerns about the people living in that area. The next meeting the compost wasn't discussed, but the day after that meeting the compost was being delivered to JRs on Bennetts Mills Road. She stated that it is her understanding the Prosecutor's Office isn't interested in this, therefore, where are they with the investigation? Attorney Cipriani explained that when the SCI received the information about three weeks ago they contacted her and asked for background information. They are still reviewing it and she hasn't heard anything back from them. This was also sent to the DCA and she wasn't contacted by them so she is trying to find out where they are with it.

JOE CANDIDO, LEANN DRIVE: He asked where they are with the township wide layoffs? Administrator Torres explained as it stands now there will be 12 members from the PBA, 6 from the TWU and 1 Confidential scheduled to be laid off July 1st. Mr. Candido then asked if the budget went up? Sharon Pinkava (CFO) explained that it did go up \$50,000. Mr. Candido stated that it went up and they are laying people off.

CAMPBELL BROWN, PRESIDENT OF PBA #168: He addressed the Council and read from a prepared statement regarding layoffs. He explained that the PBA has sat down numerous times with administration to try to come to a fair agreement only to be "shot down". This isn't just about money, but about principle. For the past thirty years this union has negotiated in good faith with the township. When the layoff notice arrived at his house he was immediately put on the defensive and ready to attack. They understand the hard economic times, but to what end should they really give up their fairly negotiated rights with no end in sight. He addressed Councilman Kafton and stated he had said he wants the unions to pay into healthcare as a possible cost savings. If the legislature in Trenton has its way that is exactly what's going to happen and there is nothing they can do about it. Therefore, they have not come to an agreement with the town and they will not make any concessions. He addressed the residents of Jackson and stated they will continue to provide exemplary service within the restrictions being put on them. He thanked the residents for their continued support. He explained that on June 30, 2011 at 4:30, 12 officers will be forced to leave their lively hood and their careers and for some their identities. He invited everyone to join them on June 30th in front of police headquarters for their exit ceremony.

MAYOR REINA: The offers that were put on the table were based upon what they are allowed to spend. They also received a 2% cap so the law says that they can't tax more than that. The other unions came to the table and offered concessions and they hoped the PBA and SOA would do the same. They don't want to take money away from anyone, but there are people in this town, not only employees, but residents who can't afford to pay anything more. If a union decides they don't want to negotiate any further then it is their decision to lay themselves off. He spoke about the non-contractual and non-union employees who bore the brunt of these hits. He spoke about the business economic summit held at Six Flags Great Adventure this past Monday. In his eyes it was successful in trying to convince businesses to come to our town. In no way has he or the Council given up. In July they will be having a reorganization meeting and they will be looking for volunteers to help with this because together he feels they can get through this. Council President Martin addressed the Mayor and stated that three years ago he froze salaries for all department heads and non-union personnel. Last year every employee in Jackson had to deal with a furlough and a 20% pay cut except the police department. He then asked the Mayor what they offered the PBA? Mayor Reina explained what they offered them wasn't going to touch their salaries and would have saved every single police officer.

MICHAEL KELLY, 391 MEADOWOOD ROAD: He stated that many of the residents have come to these meetings and have given ideas on how to save money or collect more taxes. He asked why this town still collects leaves or bulky pick-up without charging. He explained that being a father of a policeman and knowing many of the policemen he wanted to say they were going to give back. They were going for a freeze and giving back the uniform allowance and they also wanted to have a plan that goes for

more than one year. Administrator Torres explained that the discussion with the union was to close the gap until the end of the year as they continue to negotiate for those items moving forward. Mr. Kelly went on to say that the PBA also suggested starting a “slush” fund to help fund items like roadway improvements. Attorney Cipriani explained that Mr. Kelly may say what he wants to, but the people on the dais need to be careful because there are ongoing negotiations. Mr. Kelly pointed out that he believes Administrator Torres did put a lot into these negotiations and did come back with different options and other people including the Mayor didn’t like them.

DAN BURKE, DIR. OF COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT & ENFORCEMENT /MUNICIPAL ENGINEER: He began by saying it is regrettable there will be layoffs. The unions needed to come forward and work with administration to fill the budget gap. Some of the unions have come forward and he hopes the others will too. He doesn’t believe it is in the best interest of Jackson or the unions to proceed with what he has heard tonight. He believes that what the non-union employees have done is head and shoulders over what any union has done. There are 29 non-representative employees and 17 are in his department. Over the past four years they have given back \$524,000 in wage freezes and furloughs and across the entire township the number saved by furloughs is \$1.2 Million. On average the non-representative employees in his department have lost about \$30,800 per individual. He asked administration to hold their ground with the unions and ask from them what was already taken from non-union personnel.

RICK FERRARELLI, 414 COBAIN ROAD: He addressed the Mayor and Council and said if they think they are working for everyone in the town then they failed. He spoke about the PBA and explained at the end of the last contract they gave whatever the Mayor asked for. He stated that he doesn’t really care what non-union members are getting. He knows from past experience that some non-union members don’t hold the police department in high regard. He thinks the way the members of the police department were tainted tonight is appalling. The public doesn’t realize the position they will be in with layoffs. They had 92 officers at one point and now they are going down to about 65. This town has expanded and they can’t only have 6 officers on the road because there is going to be a failure. He stated he isn’t getting anything for his tax dollars. He explained that they have now pitted union against non-union members.

JAMES NUNEZ, 10 CAMBRIDGE DRIVE: He explained back in 1974 he was a delegate for the NYC police department when the city went bankrupt. One third of the police officers and fire department were laid off. He stated the political system is broken. Every politician makes promises to get elected. They give people what they want and then they can’t pay for it. The state hasn’t put money into the pension system and now the police, fire and teachers have to pay for this. He asked the Council and Mayor to let the state know this is wrong. Mayor Reina explained that the responsibility shouldn’t be with the five or six people up here who were elected. The responsibility goes back to the voter. What Mr. Nunez stated is a fact and it is happening because of “career politicians”. These people should be voted out of office. Mr. Nunez explained that he believes they do a good job, but they are part of that political system and they have access that other people don’t have. Council President Martin commended AFSCME and the TWU for working with the town.

GARRY BLACK, 76 LEWIS LANE: He stated that this is a state issue and there really isn’t anything that this administration can do about it. He spoke about the pension system at the end of the Whitman/DeFrancisco administration and how they were 90 Billion in the black. At the end of the Corzine administration we are \$100 Billion in the hole. Somebody needs to ask what happened. He believes that most of Jackson’s problems has to do with the ridiculous overspending and over borrowing beginning in about 2002. He spoke about how they bonded for a lot of items and he told them it wasn’t good because they would be paying on it for the next twenty years. He then spoke about people who came up to the microphone and used it for their own political gain. He later added that he believes the election should be moved to November and he doesn’t believe they are taking the voters rights away. In closing, he spoke about the ordinance that was on the agenda for vehicle registration, he asked them not to do it because it is over regulating.

KATHY GIANCOLA, 573 HENRY STREET: She spoke about the layoffs and asked how many non-union employees were laid off? Council President Martin replied there was one. Ms. Giancola went on to speak about the JR situation and said she really hasn't heard anything from the dais about what is going on. Council Vice President Bressi explained that the attorney gave an update earlier. There was a stop work order given that they were aware of. Also, every year they join the county with the leaves because it helps with grant money and it had nothing to do with JRs. This won't be fixed over night but they are working on it. He hasn't had any more complaints and he does go to the site and it doesn't look like much is going on. Attorney Cipriani explained they did get in front of the judge on Friday and there was a stop work order. It is very clear that there can't be anymore recycling or composting activities on site. The judge was clear that if there is failure to comply the police may take action.

RAEANN WALKER, 2 EVERGREEN COURT: She began by thanking Attorney Cipriani for all the work she put into this. She then explained that what was disturbing to her was that she was notified by the State DEP that Mr. Rasiewicz was still involved in this long after May 9th when he stood here and told us that Jackson Township was done removing the leaves. She has an email from the State DEP saying that Mr. Rasiewicz has walked the property within the past ten days. She wants to know if we removed our leaves why are we still involved? She then asked if it was possible to get an estimate of how much this pilot program cost us? She later asked if the township is paying to remove leaves from the site that other towns dumped there? In closing Ms. Walker stated that the police do a great job and everyone should be coming together instead of splitting apart. Council President Bressi stated this program was suppose to save us money, but he isn't sure if it did because they had to remove the leaves. Until they hear back from the DCA they have no reason to take any action against Mr. Rasiewicz regarding his involvement. Attorney Cipriani asked for a copy of the e-mail from the DEP.

MICHAEL KELLY, 391 MEADOWOOD ROAD: He addressed Council President Martin and asked if the Council has the power regarding shared services. Council President Martin explained that the Mayor has the power to initiate the shared service, but the Council has to approve the contract. Mr. Kelly stated he discussed shared services with the Board of Education members about putting the police back in the schools. They spoke about the negotiations and how things were cut from the budget, but shared services weren't discussed. Mr. Kelly believes during the negotiations "bridges might have been burnt" because they didn't seem willing to discuss it. Later on he explained that in the PBA contract they required a veteran officer be in the schools. He believes that should be changed because the Board of Education is trying to save money and a veteran officer makes \$150,000 compared to an officer making \$75,000. Council President Martin explained that over the past five years he has been on the Council there has been numerous shared services discussions and they have qualified for a grant with the Board of Education through the State to do a shared services study. A number of programs from the study have already been implemented. Mayor Reina explained that discussions about shared services stopped because of monetary reasons and reduction in workforce. The school resource officers were pulled from the schools because the township bore the entire burden of paying for this for years and they couldn't afford to do this anymore. We still share services such as the town uses the schools for summer camp and the town loans them plows and sweeps their parking lots when it snows. It is hard to do anything before the budgets are in place and they are still waiting to see what the state's budget is going to look like on July 1st.

DOUG PORAY, BENNETTS MILLS ROAD: He began by saying that he passes by JRs facility on Bennetts Mills Road a few times a week and even with the windows partially rolled up the smell is offensive. He can't imagine what the residents living around there are going through. He stated that a couple of meetings ago Mr. Rasiewicz stated he received notification from the DEP and never told Administration about it. He asked about accountability for Mr. Rasiewicz. Council President Martin explained that is why they sent this to the DCA, SCI and the Prosecutor. They want to find out if proper procedures were followed or if anything illegal was done. If it comes back that proper procedures were not followed and it identifies those individuals then action will be taken.

KATHY GENOVESE, 20 RUTGERS ROAD: She spoke about moving the election to November and asked why they are trying to keep the public out of this. She feels since they are doing this by ordinance it is not allowing them to have a voice. She feels they should hold off on this until the November election and put it out for vote. She explained then when she voted for them it was for a three-year term and asked why are they empowered to change that? Council President Martin explained that the new state law provides the Council and Mayor the opportunity to do that. Council Vice President Bressi stated that many other towns have already done this.
